2022 Session Recap

\$15 billion surplus in revenue -- *No sales tax or B&O tax reduction*

\$15 billion surplus in revenue -- *24% increase in budget*

Adopted a \$17 billion transportation package

No meaningful housing or GMA reform

No Emergency Powers reform

Extended implementation Long Term Care July 2023



Transportation and Infrastructure

Move Ahead Washington, 16 years, \$17 billion

- Fourth transportation package in 20 years
- No gas tax but allocates \$5.4 billion of future revenue from Climate Commitment Act
- All remaining revenues allocated to roads
- Funds \$1 billion for I-5 crossing in Vancouver
- Backfills revenue losses in Connecting Washington projects
- Allocates \$3 billion to maintenance and preservation
- Removes fuel export tax and the local option utility tax
- Transfers \$2.8 billion from the operating budget
- Fully funds fish passage barriers as mandated by the court
- Funds four new ferry vessels
- Raises about \$2.4 billion in new fees
- Removes the gas tax link to LCFS
- Funds very few projects in Eastern Washington
- Sweeps \$800 million from the public works trust fund

Land Use and Construction

Addressing the housing crisis and GMA reform were priorities this session for the majority party But all major bills died

- Governor's missing middle housing, HB 1782/SB 5670, AWB supported
- Riparian buffer bill, HB 1838/SB 5727
- Adding salmon recovery to local government planning, HB 1117
- Adding climate change to local government planning, HB 1099
